**2**<sup>nd</sup> **Form** worked in teams to write stories on the basis of their own illustrations. So they were trained in different skills: drawing, reading and writing and what's most important: their imagination and sense of cooperation were boosted.

<u>3<sup>rd</sup> Form</u> have been talking and writing about themselves: their favourite TV programs, food and sports, their families and they built beautiful family trees.

4<sup>th</sup> Form looked into a section of U S history: the Wild Far West. They brought to class stories and




songs about famous

Then they became hooked on poetry. They read poems written by 9-year-olds from England which spurred them to write their own poems about their ideas and likes.

5<sup>th</sup> Form visited two Zoos : one in San Diego and

the other in Oklahoma... through Internet, of course! Their project dealt with animals, their physical traits, customs and behaviour.



Then they read the adapted version of a classic in Literature: The Elephant Man. They imagined different endings to the novel which they illustrated very creatively.



They also did some research (through Internet and by watching a documentary) into typical houses of different peoples all over the world

(Amazon Indians, Eskimos) their customs, clothing and food.

6th Form read, discussed and illustrated the magic

legend of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table. They watched Excalibur and learnt a lot about the different characters, their virtues and flaws, their passions and their death.

<u>Lower Pre-Intermediate</u> have been writing newspaper articles about famous personalities under the headline: A Day in the Life of... based on interviews previously dramatized.
